

Afonso Reis Cabral was born in 1990. At age 15, he published his first book, a volume of poetry called Condensation.

He has a degree in Portuguese and Lusophone Studies, a Master's degree in the same area, as well as a post-graduate degree in Fiction Writing. Twice, he's traveled to Germany in search of a story - the first time at age 13 - and has worked as a carpenter and in a tourism office.

He worked in a vacancy, a tourist office and a carpenter. In 2014, he won the LeYa Prize with the novel O Meu Irmão (My Brother), which is being translated into Spanish and Italian and has already been published in Brazil. His work has appeared in dozens of publications, and in 2017, he was awarded the David Mourão-Ferreira Europe Award in the Promise category. He currently works as a freelance publisher. In his free time, he devotes himself to ornithology, does scuba diving and practices boxing.

After his parents' death, it's not clear what will happen to Miguel, a 40-year-old man with Down syndrome. Much to the family's surprise, Miguel's brother, a divorced and misanthropic university professor, decides to step up to the plate. He's only one year older than Miguel, and his warm memories of their shared childhood lead him to hope that the new family configuration will bring meaning to his life and free him from the guilt of having pulled away, years earlier. However, Miguel's arrival brings unexpected problems and the biggest of them all is a woman called Luciana.

Set in the brother's family home, a remote village in the interior of Portugal. My Brother probes the past and present of the two men, focusing on the strange and dramatic episode that threatens their relationship.

Unanimously selected as the winner of the LeYa 2014 Prize. My Brother is a remarkable novel of great literary maturity that probes the subject of disability with great sensitivity without ever giving in to sentimentality and delivers an objective and often even merciless social portrait.

João Pinto Coelho was born in London in 1967. He graduated in Architecture in 1992 and lived most of his life in Lisbon. He has spent time in the United States and worked in a theater near New York. In 2009 and 2011 he took part in two events organized by the Council of Europe in Auschwitz (Oswiecim), Poland and worked closely with several investigators on the Holocaust. At the same time, he designed and implemented the project Auschwitz in 1st Person / A Letter to Meir Berkovich, which took together young Portuguese and Polish people and took him once again to Poland, the streets of Oswiécim and concentration and extermination camps. In 2012, his first novel, Ask Sarah Gross, was published. His second novel, The Fools of Mazur Street, was awarded the LeYa award in 2017. When the ashes settled, there remained only a Jew, a Christian, and a book to be written. Paris, 2001. Yankel - a blind bookseller who asks lovers to read him in bed - is visited by Eryk, his childhood friend. They haven't seen one another since a terrible incident, during the German occupation, in the small town on the edge of the forest where they grew up and vied for the heart of local beauty Shionka. Eryk - now a famous writer - is sick and fears dying without succeeding in writing the book that he hopes will finally redeem him. In order to do so, however, he needs the memory of his Jewish friend, who has always seen far beyond his blindness.

For months, the light will remain on at the Thibault Bookstore as Yankel and Eryk plunge in the past. Under the meticulous gaze of Vivienne, an enigmatic publisher who plays her cards close to her vest, the story of a city that has always been on the razor's edge will come into sharp focus as a city of Christians and Jews, occupied by the Soviets and the Germans, where one day barbarism ran wild in the streets and nothing was as it appeared.



Patrícia Reis was born in Lisbon (1970). She began her career has a journalist in 1988 at the weekly O Independente newspaper and also worked at a weekly magazine called Sábado. She did an internship at Time magazine, in New York. She has also worked as journalist for the weekly prestigious newspaper Expresso, produced a television show called Sexualidades and worked for magazines including Marie Claire and Elle. Her books include the noves Cruz das Almas (2004) and Second Hand Love (2006), Eating you Heart Out (2007), which was included on the list of 50 finalist books of the Portugal Telecom Prize for Literature, In Silence of God (2008) and Before Being Happy (2009). She is also the author of the children's collection Micas Diares as well as two other children's books, all of which have garnered the seal of the National Book and Reading Plan. She's also authored or co-authored biographies, including Simone: A Force of Life. In 2015, she published the novel Building Up a Void, and the following year, The Grammar of Fear, co-written with Maria Manuel Viana. She's host on radio show A Páginas Tantas and she's also editor of the award-winning magazine Egoísta. Her novel From The World Up (2011) is being published in Spain shortly.

But her 10-year-old grandson is determined to pull his ailing grandmother back to the present. In order to save Babushka, he must find a way to cure her ravaged lungs, and goes in search of a miraculous plant that's her only hope.

Narrated in the first person and written from the perspective of a child, The Grandmother and the Russian Snow is a book made of the innocence and courage of childhood. A moving and emotional novel about the strength of memory and self-denial, the book follows the grandson's pilgrimage from Canada to Mexico, in hopes of finding a happy ending.

João Reis was born in Vila Nova de Gaia in 1985. After majoring in Philosophy, he founded the Eucleia Editor publishing house in 2010. He is currently a literary translator, specializing in Nordic languages, and has translated into Portuguese books by Knut Hamsun, Halldór Laxness, August Strindberg and Patrick White, among many other authors.

From 2012-2015, he lived and worked in Sweden and England, holding several jobs. He wrote the novel Grandmother and the Russian Snow during a literary residency in Montreal, Canada, in 2015. That same year, he was a finalist for the Bare Fiction Prize in the flash fiction category and published his novel The Translator Bride, soon to be published in English by Open Letter. His latest book is The Silence Devastation published in 2018, by Elsinore.

An impassioned Republican, João José Mariano Serrão played a major role in the development of the town of Estremoz, in the rural Alentejo region. Single, generous and enterprising, he opened shops, cafes and a workshop, brought electricity to the dark streets and created a ranch for orphans, to whom he gave a home and a future. Five voices tell us the story of this determined but also unassuming man, taking us on a journey that's at once personal and collective and plays out against the backdrop of some of the key moments of Portuguese history. Readers meet a teenage boy who stalked naked women and laughed at the least opportune moments; the bride whose blue eyes held a terrible secret; a young man in love with the best friend whose life is suddenly struck by tragedy; the mother who has experienced scandal and over her son's departure for war; as well as the prostitute who hid compromising documents in her bedroom and refused to marry the man who loved her. Finally, when these voices are silent, readers hear the story of a prostitute, told through the pages of a far-flung diary that was plucked from the ashes. Based on true stories. Another Voice is a fiction that offers us multiple perspectives on the same landscape, weaving together the century-long history of a family through revelations from each one of its members.

Gabriela Ruivo Trindade was born in Lisbon in 1970.

She graduated in Psychology and worked as a Psychologist and Professor until 1999. She is the mother of two children. Since 2004, she has been living in London, where she is dedicated to writing, a lifelong passion. She has two blogs, Far Far Away, (papuinlondon.blogspot.com) and Gaby Crafts (gabycrafts.blogspot.com). In 2011, her text A Womans Word won the Writing Challenge - Micronarrativas, a contest promoted by ecO-Associação Cultural de Leiria and later published in the newspaper Leiria Region. Her first novel, A Different Kind of Voice, won the Leya Prize. The story of another family figure, it has also been published in Brazil.



Filipa Fonseca Silva was born in a small town called Barreiro, just across from Lisbon, in 1979. Leonor, Alcipe, Countess d'Oeynhausen, Marquesa de Alorna are the many names of a unique and unusually plural woman. Unmistakable among the European elites for her strong personality and enormous devotion to culture, she disconcerted and dazzled 18th and 19th Century Portugal, where it was all but unheard of to be a poet and mother of eight children - not to mention being political, educated, smart and seductive.

She lived an intense and dramatic life, but never backed down, rubbing elbows with kings and emperors, philosophers and poets, even as she experienced ardent passions, both opulence and poverty, and worship and exile. After her childhood crumbled, along with the city of Lisbon, in the massive 1755 earthquake, she spent eighteen years in a convent on the orders of the Marquis of Pombal and shared his life, curiosity and affection for Lisbon, Porto, Paris, Vienna, Avignon, Marseille, Madrid and London.

Marquesa de Alorna, Lady of the World is a story of love of freedom and Portugal. It's the story of a passionate, rebellious, determined, dreamy woman who never gave up trying to grow wings in unlikely skies, like the star she had seen in the night.

Maria João Lopo de Carvalho was born in 1962 and graduated in Modern Languages and Literatures from Universidade Nova de Lisboa. 

Singing in Cabo Verde.



The granddaughter of D. Miguel I and last daughter of D. Miguel II, Maria Adelaide de Bragança, Infanta of Portugal, was born in January of 1912. From a very early age, she was a privileged witness to a rapidly changing world, the fall empires; she lived through two World Wars and actively participated in the resistance against the Nazis. Twice she was arrested and both was sentenced to death, escaping her fate thanks in one instance to Salazar's direct intervention and in other to a surprise twist of fate that allowed her to continue her struggle. When she arrived in Portugal, she shocked society by acting as an advocate for the most marginalized people. 




The mysteries of Port Wine are unveiled from its origin in the vineyards of the Douro to the long sleep in the cellars of Gaia.


In addition, the book is also full of pointers about the visitors centers in Vila Nova de Gaia and, also contains a glossary of technical terms.
